Prenatal alcohol exposure is a leading cause of disability that can result in fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) and related conditions, typically referred to as fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASD). This workshop will: 1) provide a brief overview of the effects of alcohol use on pregnancy, 2) make the link between FASD and co-occurring disorders, and 3) provide practical treatment strategies focused on adolescents and adults.
